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#### I. BACKGROUND

- The Project. The Ulaanbaatar Urban Services and Ger Areas Development Investment 1. Program (the Project) supports the Ulaanbaatar City master plan in upgrading priority service and economic hubs in ger areas. The Government of Mongolia and Asian Development Bank (ADB) signed a loan agreement to implement the Project through multitranche financing facility program. Combining spatial and sector approaches, the Project proposes an integrated solution to respond to the growing demand for basic urban services and develop subcenters as catalyst for growth in the ger areas. It involves financing core urban infrastructure and basic services in priority road sections, investments in socioeconomic facilities based on communities' needs, and the improvement of service providers' operation management. It also supports (i) community participation, awareness, and empowerment; (ii) urban planning and subcenter development; (iii) extensive on-the-job training in project management and implementation; and (iv) sector reform initiatives necessary to support the program road map and policy framework. Overall, the Project aims to improve the living conditions in Ulaanbaatar through a network of livable, competitive, and inclusive subcenters in the ger areas. With about 1,400 households affected, the investment program is categorized A for involuntary resettlement.
- 2. **The Complaint.** On 28 March 2018, the Office of the Special Project Facilitator (OSPF) received a complaint from a group of project-affected people alleging damages and negative impacts due to land acquisition and property valuation of the Project.<sup>1</sup> The Complainants were supported by two Mongolia-based nongovernment organizations (NGOs).<sup>2</sup> A similar complaint was forwarded to the Project Complaint Mechanism of the European Investment Bank, a cofinancier of the Project. The complaint to OSPF was determined eligible after a fact-finding mission was conducted in April 2018. A review and assessment of the complaint was conducted from 27 April to 3 May 2018.
- 3. The Problem-Solving Process. A series of round table discussions were conducted and culminated with the signing of a memorandum of understanding (MOU) on 2 July 2018 which also served as a guiding document for the case-by-case negotiations initiated in June 2018³ and concluded on 14 September 2018. Negotiation meetings facilitated for each complainant ranged from a minimum of one to a maximum of eight negotiating session covering value of assets, livelihood, economic and business reimbursement, transitional and moving assistance, and allocation of land plot to nontitle holders. The OSPF also customized a capacity building program to equip complainants with communication and negotiation skills prior to the negotiations. Throughout the problem-solving process, engagement of all stakeholders was assured through joint meetings where issues were discussed and addressed. Apart from building parties' trust, the extensive meetings improved the likelihood that agreed actions are implemented and followed through.
- 4. From 109 complainants,<sup>4</sup> 92 claims were resolved in favor of the complainants through case-by-case negotiations. This means that an agreement was reached on land and asset value to be compensated. Twelve complainants were found as non-affected, four refused to sell their land because of land legacy and unreasonable demand for a compensation package which was much higher than stipulated in the MOU, and one passed away.

- 5. Upon completion of the general and individual negotiation meetings, implementation and monitoring of the MOU and case-by-case negotiations were jointly developed by the parties with OSPF facilitation, which included timeline for actions leading to payment of compensation (i) ordinance issuance, (ii) concluding contracts, (iii) payment of compensation to all the complainants, and (iv) official hand over of the comparable land to the nontitle holders (36 complainants).
- 6. During a 21-25 August 2018 OSPF monitoring mission, it was clear that all stakeholders have engaged in a constructive way and developed an implementation plan. However, the Municipality of Ulaanbaatar City (MUB) and project management office (PMO) were unable to meet a few of the committed deadlines as stipulated in the MOU and case-by-case negotiation agreements. Thus, the OSPF mission facilitated agreement of the parties on a new timeline for delivering the agreed actions and the implementation and monitoring plan was updated. With this, it was concluded that the problem-solving process reached its final stage and OSPF would continue monitoring the implementation plan.

#### II. STATUS OF IMPLEMENTATION AND MONITORING PLAN

- 7. **Review and Monitoring Mission.** From 16-19 April 2019, the OSPF fielded a review and monitoring mission. Meetings were held with the Complainants, ADB Project team, PMO, and Chair of one of the supporting NGOs.<sup>5</sup> The OSPF took stock of the implementation of the agreed actions and discussed pending actions. Appendix 1 describes the status of the implementation of agreed of actions.
- 8. As of 21 May 2019, out of the 92 cases that were successfully resolved in favor of the complainants through case-by-case negotiations facilitated by the OSPF facilitator, 88 complainants have received their full compensation. Template of the minutes of the negotiation meeting with complainants is presented in Appendix 2.6 Cash compensation for one complainant is in progress. Three complainants have inadequate documentation and requested the OSPF's support in communicating and handling the existing issues with MUB, Land Agency, and PMO. Replacement land for 35 nontitle holders (complainants) have been allocated and a formal ordinance by the Mayor issuing the land title to them is pending. OSPF is following up closely on the progress of this procedure and continues to be engaged primarily in a monitoring role and will facilitate further negotiations as needed.
- 9. The OSPF discussed and agreed with the ADB Project team and PMO on the following requests from the Complainants/NGO: (i) expedite the allocation of comparable land and land titling for the remaining households; (ii) conduct a detailed needs assessment on livelihood impacts and provide livelihood restoration support for affected households on a case-by-case basis, as the current assistance provided did not restore the loss of livelihood for these affected households; and (iii) expedite the payment of transition period assistance and additional compensation to the households.
- 10. Discussions with a few Complainants confirmed that they are satisfied with the compensation amounts they received and have been able to restore their losses including buying new apartments with the money they received. They appreciated the entire problem-solving process and the partnership of all key stakeholders particularly the PMO for their constructive engagement and dialogue with the Complainants. During the meeting, the Chair of Oyu Tolgoi Watch expressed the need to further strengthen the functionality of the grievance

redress mechanism and requested to analyze the systems, processes and procedures, and build the capacity of staff handling complaints.

11. **Next Steps.** The PMO and ADB Project team will follow-up on (i) issuance of the formal ordinance on allocating 53 land parcels for the Project to meet the agreed actions for nontitle holders based on the MOU and (ii) transfer the additional compensation to the project-affected persons. The MUB needs to allocate over MNT 3 billion for this purpose.
